Soldier's Application for Pension

I, Larkin Fletcher

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Omneyton in the County of Macon

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Virginia, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of "Co." I 37 Virginia Regiment Vol Inf

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:

No later record of him has been found.

Mr. Larkin Fletcher having at the regular May term, of the Menifee County Court, 1912, filed claim and duplicate, for pension as a Confederate soldier in the Civil war, 1861-5, and same having laid over until the regular June term, 1912, and on this day two witnesses, Loft Gallunworth and Wm Sutton were introduced and duly sworn who stated that the claimant, Larkin Fletcher was now a resident of Menifee Co. Ky. and had been a resident of the State of Ky. for 41 years, and that claimant owned in his own name 100 Acres of land, worth \$500 dollars, and personal property, no dollars, and that he has nothing in his wifes name. nothing dollars, and that all of his estate did not amount to more than \$500 dollars, and that his income did not amount to more than 35 dollars, and that he was unable to earn a support by manual labor.
