Soldier's Application for Pension

I, Henry C. Moore

am a citizen of Kentucky, resident at Hudsonian in the County of Knott

in said State of Kentucky, and was a soldier from the State of Virginia, in the war between

the United States and the Confederate States and I do hereby apply for aid under the Act of the General Assembly of

Kentucky, entitled "An Act granting pension to disabled and indigent Confederate soldiers." And I do solemnly swear

that I was a member of Co. C. of 37. Virginia Regiment

in the service of the Confederate States, and that by reason of disability and indigence I am now entitled to receive the benefit of this Act. I further swear that I do not receive aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, and that I am not an inmate of any soldier's home, and that I am unable to earn a reasonable support for myself and family. I do further solemnly swear that the answers given to the following questions are true:







It is shown by the records that Henry C. Moore enlisted March 5, 1862, as a private, Company C, 37th Virginia Infantry, C.S.A. that he was captured at Gettysburg, July 4th, 1863 and held as a prisoner of war until August 24, 1863, when paroled at DeCamp General Hospital, Davids Island, New York Harbor; that he was again captured at Spottsylvania Court house, May 12, 1864; sent to Fort Delaware, Delaware, and held as a prisoner of war until June 20, 1865, when released.

The records on file in this office do not show specifically in what battles this soldier took part.

claimant Henry C Moore and have known him all his life.

In 1861 to 1864 affiant M. E. Minnich lived in Missouri and did not see claimant, but in December 1864, she returned to Lebanon, Va.; and then learned that her brother Henry was in the Confederate army (Captain McChambers Company) and she was there when Henry C Moore came home in June 1865. At that time she understood that when the war closed in April 1865, he was a prisoner and was not released until June 1865.

Affiant John W. Moore saw Henry C. Moore when he volunteered in 1862. He was at home until 1864 and knows that the family got letters from brother Henry showing that he was in Co. C 37th Va. Inf. Vols. One time brother Henry came home on prisoner's parole, and remained at home until exchanged.

Both these affiants have kept up a knowledge of their brother Henry's whereabouts and the condition of his health and now state that the claimant for pension from the State of Kentucky by reason of service in Co. C 37th Va. Inf. Vols. is the identical person that rendered that service as Henry C. Moore Co. C 37th Va. Inf. Vols. (Confederate Army)

We further declare that we have no interest in said case and we are not concerned in its prosecution.
